

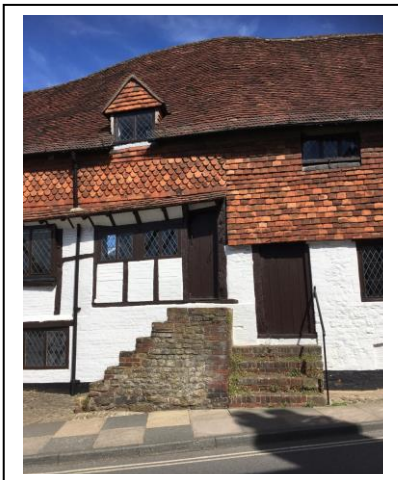
## A walk round Midhurst - Monday 11 July 2022

It was an even hotter day than last year in Lewes. On the way out, we admired the old mural painting, a remnant of the past and now again in full view. Most of the talks took place in shady places,



The town is full of historic buildings and we were lucky to be able to enter the Old Library, owned by the Town Council, where they have their meetings. At one time in the past, the building had been divided into several dwellings and on the outside one can still see several oddly placed doors.

This is the last of many burgage stones that were attached to houses in Midhurst. A burgage stone represented a vote in Parliament until the Reform Act from 1882 when the burgage stone was abolished.
