A walk round Chichester - Wednesday 12 July 2023 Feedback on this walking tour



Frances Farrer-Brown introduced us to some of Chichester's past, starting at the Cathedral, where she pointed out the division between the older parts (round arched doorways and windows) and the later gothic part with the pointed arches as seen at the entrance. None of us had ever noticed the two heads on either side of the entrance (Frances called them 'grotesques' as unlike gargoyles, they do not have a waterspout). The term is not quite appropriate here as they are faithful renditions of the real persons: Queen Elizabeth and the Duke of Edinburgh.

At one time Chichester also had a large timber castle, which was destroyed in the 13th century at the orders of Henry III. A small mound of earth is all that remains in Priory Park.
